Northampton head football coach John Toman is taking a simple approach to his season this fall.

"We're taking it one day at a time," offered Toman, who will begin his fifth season at the helm of the Konkrete program, and Kids' brings a 40-11 record. "Our goal is to get better every day. Our lines are coming together, and we have a lot of experience."

Despite losing 22 seniors and many of them at key positions, Toman likes his team's chances this fall. The Kids participated in the East Penn Conference's Northampton County-based Steel Division last fall, after the EPC North where they dominated play.


